


ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

It was intended that our APCM would be held following the All Age service on Sunday 5 April 2020. However the following has been received.

In response to COVID-19, APCMs not yet held should be suspended during the current situation, please follow the advice below:

The time for holding meetings of parishioners to choose churchwardens is extended to 31 October 2020.

The time for the admission of churchwardens is extended to 31 January 2021.

Existing 2019 churchwardens continue in office until 31 January 2021, unless re-admitted earlier or a successor is admitted earlier.

The period for holding APCMs is extended to 31 October 2020.

Existing 2017-20 lay members of deanery synod continue in office until 30 November 2020 even where their successors may have been elected at 2020 APCMs.

Deanery synod secretaries must provide the Diocesan office with names, addresses and emails of clergy and lay members as soon as possible and no later than 1 July 2020.

Unless the APCM has already been held, PCC members for 2019 will continue in office until the postponed 2020 APCM.

The week that *changed* the world continues to *change* our lives

Even though we cannot join together at St. Margaret's this year, Easter - the most important of Christian festivals - will be celebrated in our homes and in our hearts. Holy Week enables us to live with Christ his final days on earth. We can enter Jerusalem with him by means of a **Palm Sunday** procession (around our own gardens rather than around our churchyard), we can be present at the Last Supper and in the Garden of Gethsemane on **Maundy Thursday**, we can watch at the foot of the cross on **Good Friday** and we finally rejoice as he conquers death on **Easter Day**. It's a week-long witness to Christ's suffering, death and resurrection.

On **Palm Sunday** the church procession represents Jesus' journey from Bethany to Jerusalem. The congregation, by joining in the outdoor procession led by the clergy, publicly professes its loyalty to Christ. Anyone waiting at the church door can liken themselves to those who came out of Jerusalem to welcome Jesus. Kings would normally arrive by horse but Jesus rode on a donkey. His disciples laid their cloaks on its back for a saddle and other followers, attracted by the news of his miracles and teaching, spread their own cloaks on the ground before him. They also laid and waved newly cut palm branches, which were a national symbol of Judaea brandished at times of celebration and depicted on coins. Matthew and John, recording the event, recall words in the Book of the Prophet Zechariah (9.9): 'Look, your king is approaching humble and riding on a donkey'.


The word *Maundy* comes from the Latin word *mandatum* meaning *commandment*; 'I give you a new commandment: love one another just as I have loved you' (John 13.34). On the first **Maundy Thursday** Christ commanded followers 'to love one another' and washed his disciples' feet. On that same day Jesus sent Peter and John into Jerusalem in order to follow a man carrying a pitcher of water to a house. Christ assured them that they would be shown an upstairs room where they could make preparations for the Passover feast. Before the meal, Jesus washed the feet of his disciples (John 13.4-15), an act usually undertaken by servants, and subsequently warned that one of them would betray him. During the meal he broke a piece of bread, blessed it and said '*This is my body*'. He then picked up a cup of wine saying '*This is my blood*'. This was the first Holy Communion. Jesus and his disciples then made their way to the Garden of Gethsemane at the foot of the Mount of Olives. At around midnight Judas appeared and greeted Jesus with a customary kiss, which led to his arrest by the chief priests.

Good Friday derives from *God's Friday* but is also known as Holy or Great Friday. At first light Jesus appeared before the Sanhedrin, the supreme Jewish court, before

being handed over to Roman governor Pontius Pilate. When asked 'Are you the king of the Jews?' Jesus replied 'It is you who say it'. Pilate then asked the crowd 'What am I do to with Jesus who is called Christ?' to which they replied 'Let him be crucified'. They did so again even when Pilate asked them what it was that Jesus had done wrong. On the top of the high ground at Golgotha, Jesus was nailed to a cross to die. He was mocked by the crowd whilst Mary Magdalene and other women watched from nearby.

On **Easter Day** those same women arrived at the tomb with spices to anoint Jesus' body but found the stone rolled away and only folded grave clothes inside. When Mary enquired of the gardener where the body been taken, the man spoke, revealing himself as Christ by saying 'Mary, go and find my brothers and tell them: I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God'. The resurrection of Christ was proof that, after all the doubts, there was life after death and good could triumph over evil. In death life is not ended but changed. God has power over life and death. Jesus was and is God, and that reassurance continues to change our lives.

One important one for those reading this may well be how would prayer help or does prayer really work? In times such as we are experiencing prayers are important and most definitely can help. Prayer helps to concentrate the mind, and in times of quiet God speaks. The Apostle James writes: "Is anyone in trouble? He should pray. Is anyone Happy? Let him sing songs of praise" James 5:13.

Joseph Medicott Scriven (1819-1886) encompasses this theme in a hymn many of you will be familiar with:

What a friend we have in Jesus, all our sins and griefs to bear!
What a privilege to carry everything to Him in prayer!
O what peace we often forfeit, O what needless pain we bear,
all because we do not carry everything to God in prayer.

Even in situations of such as we have never experienced before God is with us in the thick of all that is happening. Our Heavenly Father will be suffering with those who are in pain and suffering. He will be working and showing His love through the hands and knowledge of the carers, doctors and nurses. The world is His creation and overall He wants us and everyone worldwide to enjoy that world, but sadly He gets let down. Thousands die young through civil war, poverty, famine all things we as part of the creation need to do something about. The Coronavirus, like all other disasters in the world can and will be overcome and it will happen quicker if politicians of different persuasions stop trying to get one over on each other; if governments throughout the world work together for the common good of all through love and kindness, justice and Peace. It is in their grasp especially in a worldwide crisis. Wishful thinking perhaps but part of the Lord's Prayer is "Your kingdom come, your will be done on earth..." God has already given us the means to overcome so much adversity but everyone has to come together.

For those who find it difficult to think of the words to pray at this time I have chosen two from the website: www.churchofengland.org


Gracious God,

Dear friends,

Guidelines and instructions from the Government and the Church of England have been tumbling out daily, changed and updated many times by the time I write this message (24th March).

The spread of the Coronavirus Covid-19 has changed our lives. People in vulnerable groups, and anyone with symptoms which might indicate viral infection, are being told to self-isolate. All gatherings are now suspended – from church services to pubs to sports events and including our flower festival. We are instructed to keep a physical distance from each other if we are out in public – doing only essential tasks.

It's a very different world from the one we're all used to. And yet, the fundamentals of life haven't changed: we still must eat and sleep. The sun still rises and sets. The birds still sing. Spring is with us, as the blossom on the trees tells us.

The people who love us still love us. The people who need us, need us even more than before and the God who loves us is the same as ever: faithful and true.

During Lent we remember how God self-isolated for us. From the glory of heaven in the presence of the Father and the Holy Spirit, God the Son chose to become human and spent forty days in the wilderness before starting his ministry among the people.

God wanted to rescue us from our epidemic of sin, and so came to be one of us. Once he was here, far from isolating himself from infection, Jesus came right into the middle of our human mess and muddle. Far from not touching the infected, he touched the lepers, the outcasts, the unclean. It was, in the end, human sin that killed him, nailing him to a cross, even though he was never infected.

This Easter we once again gratefully celebrate the completion of God's rescue mission to us. Jesus, the baby in the manger we celebrate at Christmas, became the man on the cross we think about on Good Friday. Jesus who died on the cross is the one who rose from the dead on Easter Sunday to show that the rescue mission was a success.

Whatever the coming weeks and months bring, nothing is going to change that message. We are part of the story of Jesus Christ sharing the Good News of God – God is here, present with us, sharing in the messiness, and the glory, of life.

Though we may be physically separated at this time we are bound together in God.

God bless you and keep you.

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



St Agnes is depicted in art with a lamb, evoking her name which resembles the Latin word for "lamb", *agnus* and her feast day is 21st January. Amongst others Agnes is patron saint to gardeners. She is also the patron saint of young girls. Folk custom called for them to practise rituals on Saint Agnes' Eve (20–21 January) with a view to discovering their future husbands. This superstition has been immortalised in John Keats's poem, "The Eve of Saint Agnes".

Agnes was born in 291 AD and raised in a Christian family. She was from a wealthy family and reputedly had great physical beauty but whenever a man wished to marry Agnes, she would always say, "Jesus Christ is my only Spouse." A number of her suitors decided to try to force her into marriage by denouncing her as a Christian. The Governor promised Agnes wonderful gifts if she would only deny God, but Agnes refused. He tried to change her mind by putting her in chains, but her lovely face shone with joy. Next he arranged for her to be dragged naked through the streets to a brothel, but an Angel protected her. At last, she was condemned to death. Even the pagans cried to see such a young and beautiful girl going to death. Yet, Agnes was as happy as a bride on her wedding day. She did not pay attention to those who begged her to save herself. "I would offend my Spouse," she said, "if I were to try to please you. He chose me first and He shall have me!" Then she prayed and bowed her head for the death-stroke of the sword. There are many other stories around the martyrdom of Agnes, including her hair growing and covering her body and all the men that attempted to rape her were immediately struck blind. She was meant to be burned to death but stories are told of the wood not burning and of flames parting from her. She was 13 when she was killed.

Women from the churches in Leiston worked to prepare the service which was planned by the women of Zimbabwe. The guidelines for the services are different every year and as I wrote last month, greeting attendees with a drink of water in a clay pot proved problematical. However ever resourceful members of the planning group made sisal plaited bookmarks, plaited mats and Woodbridge Golf Club came up trumps with lovely exotic floral arrangements! Three coloured candles, one red (representing love), one white (peace), and yellow (reconciliation) were kindly provided by a member of our congregation who has a home here and was planning the service at her home church.

Looking ahead to happier times

For many years now, church members and friends have supported the Samaritan's Purse Shoebox Appeal. We have been able to put together an increasing amount of boxes each year as a result of your kind generosity.

We have decided, therefore, to give our support this year to a different charity, the Link to Hope Shoebox Appeal. The following is taken from their website and gives details of how the charity operates. More information will follow later in the year but we wanted to let you know of our plans well in advance.

Many thanks again for your past support; we look forward to working together on this new project which will enable us, at St. Margaret's, to help others at a special time of year.

Why support the Link to Hope Shoebox Appeal?

We ask people to fill a Shoebox for a family – not just a child. Our list contains items for all family members and includes items such as a shower gel/shampoo, family games, stationery items, gifts for mum and dad as well as sweets, soft toys, hats, scarves etc.

- Our annual **Family Shoebox Appeal** has been running since 1992 and has delivered smiles to thousands of people in Eastern Europe over the years. In fact, we have sent over 900,000 shoeboxes to hundreds of different locations! It's a really simple idea, anyone can get involved, and we are always keen to have more people join our national network of supporters.

The **Family Shoeboxes** of gifts are given to families who often have to make a choice between buying food or fuel at Christmas time – buying presents is just not a priority. Many of these families do not have running water, heating or electricity. Some live in appalling conditions, often living in just one or two rooms, and life for them is a real struggle to survive.



- A shoebox for a family means that everyone receives a gift. A scarf for the mum, a tape measure for the dad, toys and games for the children as well as stationery and coloured pens. Also toiletries, toothpaste, shampoo and soap to keep everyone clean and free from the germs that make them ill. And of course sweets and chocolates for everyone – a family favourite.

Due to the number of elderly people that are now being left alone due to their families leaving to work away, we have launched the **Elderly Shoebox Appeal**. The boxes are similar however the children's games and education materials are replaced with a wind up torch, sensory items, candle and holder etc.

- Boxes are sent to **Romania, Bulgaria, Moldova and Ukraine**.
- We are small enough that we have a personal relationship with all the key contacts in Eastern Europe



who distribute your Shoeboxes and we do spot checks to ensure that your boxes are received by the correct people. We are a **Christian charity** who believes in distributing love to those in need regardless of background, colour, creed or religion.

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

EASTER CUSTOMS

Easter is the most important and the most joyous of all festivals. Through the death of Jesus on Good Friday we have forgiveness for sins; in His resurrection on Easter Sunday we have a new life for ever.

EASTER EGGS

The custom of giving eggs is one that can be traced back as far as 900 BC to ancient China where eggs were decorated and used to signify the return of spring and the continuation of life. To the Christian the Easter egg can be a symbol of the resurrection of Jesus, and our rising with him to new life.

COLOURED HARD BOILED EGGS

- 1 Wrap eggs in onion skins, beetroot skins or spinach leaves. Tie in place with string or wool
- 2 Boil eggs for 30-40 minutes and allow to cool
- 3 Unwrap eggs. If you like you can scratch patterns into the colour with a pin
- 4 With a little kitchen oil on a soft cloth rub the eggs until shiny

The eggs can be drawn on with candle wax before wrapping in skins and the pattern made by the wax will resist the dye and produce an attractive effect

EASTER BISCUITS

250 g plain flour	75 g caster sugar
Pinch salt	1 egg, beaten
½ tsp mixed spice	75 g currants
75 g butter or margarine	

Method

- 1 Sieve the flour, salt and spice together
- 2 Cream the butter and sugar together until light and fluffy
- 3 Beat in a little egg and flour
- 4 Stir in the currants and remaining flour to make a stiff dough
- 5 Roll out on a floured surface to ¼ thick. Cut into shapes
- 6 Prick with a fork, brush with a little milk and sprinkle with sugar
- 7 Place on a greased baking tray and bake in the oven at Gas Mark 3/170° C/325° F for 20 minutes
- 8 Cool on cooling rack and store in airtight container
