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Expect the unexpected ...

This year is a year of the unexpected. We did not know a year ago that there would be a pandemic in 2020. Now we are still living in the pandemic. I write this letter in mid-November, we are in high restrictions – minimising contact in order to reduce transmission of the Covid-19 virus. In December we might have a change in the restrictions but at this moment I don't know for certain.

We have had to get used to living with the unexpected. With changes to the way we live and interact with others. I have had to learn some new skills, including; online video calls and video editing. We may have had to change the way we work. We have come to expect the unexpected ...

It has always been the case that our lives can change, unexpected events do happen, it just seems that this year we have had to expect changes on a frequent basis. When we read the accounts of the birth of Jesus Christ in the gospels of Matthew and Luke they start with the unexpected. Mary does not expect to see an angel and hear the news that she will give birth to the son of God.

God is with us in unexpected times, in times of uncertainty. Hope in God can help to reduce fear and anxiety of the unexpected. We learn of this hope from other people and from the accounts in the Bible. Hope in God helped Mary overcome her fear and have trust that all will be well.

This year worship in St Margaret's Church and in the community will be different. I can't tell you now what we will be doing in church – watch out for news nearer the time. I can tell you of two things that we are preparing. Firstly, a retelling of the Christmas story, broken into small chunks, one for each day of Advent. These will be told, by video, by many members of our congregation and shared via email and the church Facebook page. Secondly, there will be a display in the East of England Co-op Funeral Services window, in Sizewell Road, Leiston. We

shall be using the Nativity figures made by Liz Outten and stars made by children at the Primary School.

As we live today and look forward for tomorrow may we have hope and peace.

This is one of the prayers that we use on Advent Sunday -

*O Lord our God,
make us watchful and keep us faithful
as we await the coming of your Son our Lord;
that, when he shall appear,
he may not find us sleeping in sin
but active in his service
and joyful in his praise;
through Jesus Christ our Lord*

May you have a peaceful Advent and joyful Christmas.

Pondering Prayer

In his first book *Reflections on the Psalms* CS Lewis writes, “the most valuable thing the Psalms do for me is to express the same delight in God which made David dance.” David being King David who is said to have written many of the Psalms. We can understand what Lewis meant as we read the excitement and words of praise that many of these wonderful poems contain. But sadly I also fear that for some the faith, purpose and feeling of the Psalmist remains unseen and unfelt when read or sung in churches.

Having spent time at a religious college where Matins and Evensong were sung daily meant going through the whole Psalter once a month. I admit that at first I took a couple of weeks to get used to the discipline although

the actual singing of Psalms to Gregorian Chant helped to quickly bring the joy into the praising and thanksgiving that the words give to the worship of God. I then settled down quickly to the daily routine appreciating the services and accepting that the words written millenniums before were as relevant to our lives today as they were to the Psalmist.

Singing of the Psalms is no longer widespread in churches Matins and Evensong no longer mainstream services, unless you live near a cathedral perhaps, which I think is a great shame.

There are many Psalms I particularly love and hope to talk about each of these over time. The one I have chosen for this month is Psalm 107 which for many years I have found conducive to prayer and often helps me find the words to say to our Heavenly Father when I cannot always bring the words to mind myself. The 1st verse alone is so full of meaning:

“It is good to give thanks to the Lord for His love endures forever.”

If you ever needed to be reminded that God is Love (1John:7ff) that verse is a good start. No matter what is happening in our lives, good or not so good, we are reminded that the Spirit of God, the Spirit of Love, remains with us ready to strengthen and refresh us.

As with so many of the Psalms written by the early Israelites 107 mirrors much and more of what we read in the Old Testament. The pain that they suffered, their achievements, their hopes and their fears; of God as a creator and God who would help them and to whom the Psalmist is so grateful. It encourages us to look back over our own lives and to see how the love of God was always with us although we may not have noticed it at the time.

We pray: Holy God, when our memories blot out your kindness and we ignore your patient love, remember us, remake us, and help us to understand the rich inheritance of Jesus Christ our Lord which you offer to us all. Amen

A PARTRIDGE IN A PEAR TREE

There is one Christmas Carol that has always baffled me.

What in the world do leaping lords, French hens, swimming swans and especially the partridge who won't come out of the pear tree, have to do with Christmas? This week, I found out.

From 1558 until 1829 Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practise their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote this carol as a catechism song for young Catholics.

It has two levels of meaning: the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning known only to members of their church. Each element in the carol has a code word for a religious reality which children could remember.

- *The partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ
- *Two turtle doves were the Old and New Testaments
- *Three French hens stood for faith, hope and love
- *The four calling birds were the four Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John
- *The five golden rings recall the Torah or Law, the first five books of the Old Testament
- *The six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation
- *Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit – Prophecy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership and Mercy
- *The eight maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes
- *Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit – Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness and Self Control
- *The ten lords a-leaping were the Ten Commandments
- *The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples
- *The twelve drummers drumming symbolised the twelve points of belief in the Apostles' Creed



So, there is your history for today. This knowledge was shared with me and I found it interesting and enlightening and now I know how that strange song became a Christmas Carol so pass it on if you wish.

Merry (Twelve Days of) Christmas Everyone – and remember, the Twelve Days of Christmas are the twelve days following 25 December. The Christmas Season runs until Epiphany 6 January.

THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION POPPY APPEAL 2020

This year the Poppy Appeal was very different from that held in previous years. No house-to-house collections or collecting in the street this year because this could not be done whilst undertaking social distancing. The Leiston branch of the East of England Co-op as always welcomed our collectors and did all they could to help. People were ready to collect donations on 29th, 30th and 31st October and 5th, 6th and 7th November. All went well in the first week and everyone was very generous. However a second lockdown was imposed from Thursday 5th November meaning we could not be in the Co-op as collecting for the Appeal was not visiting the doctor, going to work, attending school, doing essential shopping – all things deemed permissible by HM Government.

On Monday 2nd I visited the Manager and asked if we could change our dates and collect 3rd and 4th November instead and he gave his permission. I put up posters where I could, advising of the change in date. Apologies to those who came on 5th, 6th, 7th November to get poppies – I had no wish for the volunteers to be fined for breaking lockdown.

Several people who missed our collection days in the Co-op popped their donations in an envelope and put it through my letterbox. Some were able to donate online. Organisations made donations for wreaths which were paraded through the town and placed at the War Memorial on Remembrance Sunday. I am told that as the parade went past the houses people stood on their doorsteps or in their front gardens and applauded as the parade went past. The wreath laying was followed by a short open air service around the Memorial.

The total sum collected for the Poppy Appeal so far is £3070 46. A very sincere THANK YOU to everyone for supporting The Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal.





God is our refuge and strength, always ready to help in times of trouble.

Psalm 46:1 | New Living Translation

Last month we shared with you that we have been looking for a bungalow. At that time we thought we knew where we might be living, although Jim wisely cautioned that we should not say where that was until we had completion of the sale. If I mentioned anything to anyone, he was sure to say, "We haven't got it yet!"

Imagine our shock when on 5th November, our solicitor advised us to withdraw from the purchase because of complications with the lease! That very morning I had read the verse at top of the page, and the words, "always ready" stood out as I read them. I am often amazed at how the Holy Spirit brings to us just the right word when we need it. Those words, 'always ready' gave me such confidence. I am not a nuisance coming to God with yet another need. He isn't waiting to chide me if things go wrong. He is *always ready to help* in times of trouble.

We had of course prayed much about the way forward and we can only thank the Lord for such wise guidance. We took our solicitor's advice and searched the internet once again. By this time there were only two bungalows available within our price range. The following day we viewed both and put an offer in on one of them. The Estate Agent warned us that there needed to be agreement between three siblings, who had inherited the property, so it may take some time to contact them all. We were so delighted to receive a 'phone call a couple of hours later, to let us know that our offer had been accepted.

The psalmist continues in Psalm 46 "So we will not fear when earthquakes come The Lord of heaven's armies is here among us. The God of Israel is our fortress Be still and know that I am God." Of course, it is only natural to be afraid when danger is present. It helps me to focus on using my will and determination to trust the Lords to outweigh the emotional reaction, which is only to be expected. Being still and knowing, deeply believe, that God is in this situation with me, helps me to shift from the fear to the assurance, that the God of Heaven's armies is with his people.

As Jim and I prepare to move to living on one level, which is going to make life much easier from a physical point of view, we find ourselves thinking about the ten years we have spent as members of St Margaret's. We are grateful for the loving welcome we received and the beautiful worship space God led us to in September 2010. We are grateful for the joys we have shared and also the privilege of sharing in the heartaches as well. Collectively, we have experienced so many answers to prayer. We have welcomed new people into the fellowship of our church and we have sadly said farewell to others, some who have gone before us and are part of the great cloud of witnesses we read of in Hebrews 12.

I firmly believe that the time we spend with one another creates a bond, which results in us taking something you have built into our lives, with us and equally means that we leave something of ourselves behind with you. Our situation is very fluid at the moment and we are not sure whether we will still be living in Leiston by Christmas. Wherever we will be, we wish you God's rich blessing. How good it is to remember, that Jesus is the reason for the season, and whatever restrictions we may or may not face, the loving presence of the Lord in our homes and our hearts cannot be taken from us.


