Be patient ...

I wonder if you ever had that moment when someone said to you - "be patient"?

Maybe, as a child, on the night before a birthday party the sense of excitement was building inside you and you were almost bursting with energy and someone calmed you, and encouraged you to be patient, to wait, the day will be here soon.

Every year many people observe the Christian season of Advent. It starts on Advent Sunday, four Sundays before Christmas. Each Sunday we light a candle on the Advent Wreath and then on Christmas Day we light a candle in the centre. That central candle celebrates the moment when the Christ Child was born. One of the titles Jesus was given was 'Emmanuel', which means 'God is with us'. We celebrate God here among us, living as one of us.

Wait, be patient, that is on Christmas Day. Now we are in Advent which comes from Latin and means an arrival. We look forward to an arrival, *the* arrival of God with us. Not just the arrival of the Christ Child but also the promise of Christ who will be with us again.

In many churches Advent is marked by changing the colours inside the church, to purple, and there are no flowers in church. We do the same in Lent, before Easter. We do this to focus our attention on God, to remember God's love, the love that was prepared to sacrifice the life of Jesus so that we would know that we can be forgiven and be close to God. Even if we are going to carol services, concerts, shops to buy gifts, during Advent there is something within us that is waiting and looking forward. And life doesn't stop during Advent, we carry on working, caring, laughing, crying, cooking, serving until ...

... The Christmas Candle is lit and we rejoice. The colours in the church are changed to white or gold, flowers and decorations are displayed and the Christ Child is put in the Crib scene. This is one of the prayers that we use in church on Advent Sunday –

*O Lord our God,
make us watchful and keep us faithful
as we await the coming of your Son our Lord;
that, when he shall appear,
he may not find us sleeping in sin
but active in his service
and joyful in his praise;
through Jesus Christ our Lord*

May you have a peaceful Advent and joyful Christmas.

A CAUTIONARY TALE

Stephen Fry recommended it. My wife insisted I did it. My sister agreed. And yet when I spoke to doctors about it they were fairly ambivalent about it, leaving the decision in my court. I spoke to three, at different times. I am talking about having my prostate checked with a PSA blood test.

For a man of my age with my profile, never having smoked and at the recommended weight for my height I did not need to worry I was told. I eat a healthy diet. I have always been active and continue on good regime of exercise on a daily basis. Everything was fine. It is not a definitive test anyway. It is not conclusive. Further investigation can cause more problems I was told. On the third consultation I asked to go ahead with a PSA blood test. Yes, you need to ask for it. There is no screening programme set up. The result came back showing I had a worryingly high count.

So, I had further tests and a biopsy confirmed that I did indeed have prostate cancer, and it is in a more advanced stage. We never know until it happens what our reaction to hearing such news is going to be until it actually happens. Disbelief, numb, shock, anger. Why me? What have I done to deserve this? It is all there.

I have now had MRIs and bone scans to ascertain the extent of any spread. I await those results. All I can do now is wait and prepare as best I can for what is to come.

THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION POPPY APPEAL 2018

The Appeal has gone well this year. The Leiston Air Cadets helped, very efficiently, to fill the poppy boxes again this year. Everything was in place at the start of the two week period permitted for the collection. As usual collectors were at both entrances of the Co-op for four days, on 1, 5, 6 and 7 November. The total collected on those four days was £912 63 and we are very grateful to the East of England Co-operative at Leiston and the staff there who enable us to complete the collection. A special mention should be made of Myron who helped us to set up our table on 1 November as there was a problem with our booking. On 10 November three groups from the Army Cadet Force collected in the town and raised the magnificent sum of £204 16 in two hours. Following on from their stint in Leiston they travelled to Saxmundham and collected there for the Poppy Appeal.

The ever popular Festival of Remembrance, hosted by the Leiston Royal British Legion Band at Leiston Film Theatre, was well attended on Wednesday 7 November. The sum of £1,069 00 was raised for the Poppy Appeal through a raffle and the sale of seats. Most grateful thanks to Leiston Town Council and Leiston Film Theatre for their help with this event.

On Sunday 11 November the Remembrance Sunday Parade and Service took place. The day had started wet but the rain stopped in time for the parade to the church, led by the RBL Band and standards. The parade comprised members of the Town Council, the Suffolk Regiment Old Comrades, Army and Air Cadets, Scouts, Cubs, Beavers, Guides and Brownies. The exhortation and two minutes silence took place outside the church at 11 am and then everyone moved into the church for the service.

This year three new collectors came forward and two additional businesses in the town requested Poppy boxes. I have also been approached by someone who has an All Year Round collecting box but would also like to have a Poppy box next year in his shop. I would be pleased to hear from any other business or organisation in Leiston or Sizewell who would like to help in any way. My very sincere thanks go to all those who have helped with the Appeal this year. I thank the people who are prepared to collect house to house and at the Co-op; shops and businesses in the town who are happy to have collecting boxes on their premises. Special thanks to Sue Hawkes of Sizewell who made the superb floral tributes in the church. The Leiston and Sizewell RBL Poppy Appeal stands at £5,783 87 at the moment.



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

SUMMERHILL – That Dreadful School

The Alde Valley Suffolk Family History Group held its first monthly meeting at Knodishall Village Hall, where a 100 strong audience was enthralled by an afternoon talk given by Zoë Redhead, Principal of Summerhill School, Leiston.

The independent school was founded by Zoë's father, A.S. Neill, in 1921. A native of Forfar, Scotland, 'Neill', as he is known affectionately, was a 'pupil teacher' before moving on to Edinburgh University, having been told that 'there was nothing he was good at, so he might just as well go into teaching'. After graduating, he taught at Gretna Green, questioning why his pupils, the majority of whom were destined to work on the land, needed to be taught things of no relevance. Neill left Scotland to work as a journalist in London. However, the call of teaching still proved strong and he took up an opportunity to work at the Neue Schule in Dresden, Germany, where he set up a teaching annexe that effectively marked the birth of Summerhill.

As tensions mounted in Europe, Neill returned to England, buying a home called 'Summerhill' in Lyme Regis. He spent 4 years in Dorset before determining to set off round the coast of England until he could find alternative affordable accommodation. Hence, he arrived in Leiston and bought a property originally built by the Garrett family, that had since become a children's home called 'Newhaven'. To this day, Summerhill is still sometimes referred to as the 'Home School'.

Today, Summerhill provides education to some 80 pupils; the majority are residential and about two thirds are foreign nationals. Teaching is delivered by some 18 staff, a number of whom are peripatetic. Education spans the whole of the national curriculum and pupils are prepared for GCSEs, although the school is ultimately relaxed about whether the children sit the exams or not. As can be imagined, the operating model at Summerhill has led to the occasional clash with Government and the school inspectorate. Following more recent differences of opinion with Ofsted, the school is now assessed by the Independent Schools Inspectorate, who judge the school's performance against its stated aims.

Plans are currently underway to mark the school's centenary in style, and it is hoped that the celebrations will include open days for local residents. So, look out for further news and take the opportunity to raise a glass to this wonderful institution and its inspired founder, A.S. Neill. We look forward to welcoming you to our next meeting in the New Year. In the meantime, we wish you and your families a very happy and relaxing Christmas.


