

Let there be light ...

February can be a gloomy month with a lot of cloud cover and we revel in the occasional sunny day and the growth of the early flowers but many consecutive cloudy days can sometimes make us feel sad. What helps you overcome times of sadness?

Each person has their own way of acknowledging sadness and learning how to approach life. In church we often use the image of Jesus Christ as the Light of the World. A light that helps us to see all things in their reality and also a light that gives hope and reassurance.

For the last fifty years The Children's Society have used a special church service to highlight the work of the charity and to raise funds for their cause. The service is called Christingle – it is all about Jesus Christ being the centre and the light of the world. At the heart of the service is the making of the Christingle. It looks unusual but every part has a meaning.



It starts with an orange, which represents the world.

Into the orange are placed four sticks with dried fruit or sweets. These represent all the goodness of the world. The amazing riches that we share.

Around the orange is wrapped a red ribbon. The ribbon is the love poured out to us, by God. God gave of himself, shown to us by the sacrificial death of Jesus Christ. A love that speaks of that unconditional giving no matter who we are or what our situation.

In the top of the orange is placed a candle, which is then lit. This is Christ the Light of the World.

At our Sunday morning service on 3 February (10.30am) the Christingle will be used as part of our worship. That day is also known as Candlemas, from an ancient tradition when candles (the main source of light in the home) were brought to the church to be blessed. On that day we remember the child Jesus being taken to the great temple in Jerusalem to be blessed, and two elderly people, Simeon and Anna, prophesied that this child was the Messiah – the one blessed by God who would guide all people.

Maybe, if you are feeling confused or sad, you might remember the image of the Christingle and sense the light of Christ in your life. God bless you.

Pondering Prayer

Another word we could use for prayer, is relationship. In James chapter four, verse eight in the New Testament, we are encouraged to “come near to God and he will come near to you.” As soon as we move in his direction, the Lord is moving toward us – or maybe God is moving toward us first and as soon as we respond and move to draw close to him, he draws even closer to us. There are many examples of invitations to relationship in the Bible.

In I Samuel chapter three we have the beautiful story of a small boy developing a relationship with the Lord. God is inviting him into a relationship. He is used to being called upon to do various tasks in the Tabernacle and was already alert and responsive. When God called him, he assumed it was Eli the priest, wanting him to fulfil some task.

First and foremost, the Lord wants us to BE with him, to experience his love for us and others before we start the DOING. Often in order to be in a relationship with our Heavenly Father, we need another person alongside, to help us discern the stirrings in our heart. I have a very vivid memory of a teacher who helped me as I talked with her one day. As I struggled with what was going on in my heart, she told me how her own relationship with the Lord Jesus began. A friend had pointed her to a verse in Romans chapter ten, “If you openly declare that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.” (verse 9)

Something clicked for me that day, just as her friend had enabled her to a new understanding. We all need a soul friend who can encourage us to understand what is going on inside us at times. Samuel had Eli, who realised this responsive little boy was entering into a new relationship with the Lord and so encouraged him to respond next time by simply saying, “Speak Lord, your servant is listening.”

As we move forward into uncertain times, may we be encouraged as we strengthen our relationship with the Lord, by turning to him often with the response, “Speak Lord, I’m ready to pay attention to you.”

A prayer :

Heavenly Father, we thank you for the Lord Jesus who made it possible for us to draw near to you. May your Holy Spirit, the Helper, guide us into a deep and fulfilling relationship with you. This we ask in Jesus’ Name. Amen.

COME - EVERYTHING IS READY!

Everything is ready and the invitation is for everyone – men, women and children of all ages to join this Day of Prayer.

Women of Slovenia, one of the smallest and youngest countries in Europe, have prepared this year's service and they encourage us to reflect on the barriers they have faced since the end of the Second World War when their country was a part of Yugoslavia, a Marxist socialist republic. They share the challenges they have met and the hopes they have for the future.

World Day of Prayer is an international, inter-church organisation which enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. The preparation for the day is vast. An international committee is based in New York and there are national committees in each participating country. Regional conferences meet to consider the service and then local groups make their plans.

Finally at a church near you on Friday 1 March 2019 people will gather to celebrate the service prepared by the women of Slovenia.

The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 120 countries. It begins in Samoa and prayer in native languages travels throughout the world – through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Samoa some 38 hours later.

What is Fairtrade?




Leiston is a “Fairtrade Town” – but what does that mean? It means that a community group in the town organised and encouraged the use of Fairtrade marked goods across the town. That small group is still going and still encouraging us to be aware of the goods that we buy.

Every year the Fairtrade organisation promotes the use of Fairtrade goods during Fairtrade fortnight (25 February to 10 March).

Fairtrade is a movement for change that works directly with businesses, consumers and campaigners to make trade deliver for farmers and workers.

The international Fairtrade system (which the Fairtrade Foundation is a part of) represents the world's largest and most recognised fair trade system. They are a global organisation working to secure a better deal for farmers and workers.

At St Margaret’s, during our main Sunday Service on 24 February (10am), we will be highlighting the work of the Fairtrade Foundation and what it means to live in a fair and just society. Our invited speaker will be Tim Aldred, the Head of Policy for Fairtrade Foundation UK.



The banana image is one way of showing how the farm worker gets a tiny part of the cost of a product and often is the one who is short-changed when global buyers (such as supermarkets) reduce the price of products.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD – SHOEBOX APPEAL 2018

An amazing 511,200 shoeboxes were filled and sent to Eastern Europe, Africa, Central Asia and the Middle East. Our 44 shoeboxes were amongst the 66,837 sent to children in Belarus in Eastern Europe.

Natasha, aged 9, who lives in an orphanage sends this message. "It wasn't just my first Christmas gift – it was my first gift ever. When I held it, there was joy and love in my heart such that I never felt before. I knew there were people out there who cared for me. I was not alone As my whole class was running around seeing what everyone else got, I just stood in one place in amazement. I couldn't believe what was going on and what I was seeing in my box There was a doll, a colouring book, crayons and hair clips. It took a minute to let it all sink in. Because of my shoebox gift, I knew that the world wasn't over yet. There was more to life than what I'd experienced. We were not forgotten. We were still loved".

Many thanks again to everyone who helped in any way with our contribution to this Appeal. Every shoebox, packed with love and fuelled by prayer, has the potential to impact a child's life in a very special way! **Sandra Harle**



BURNS NIGHT COMES TO ST. MARGARET'S

Robert Burns, it should be said, was not a Son of Leiston, and there is no record that he ever set foot in St Margaret's Church. But as you know, the Clergy and PCC are forever seeking new events to stage in the beautiful surroundings of the Church, and the chance to celebrate the life and work of the great Scottish poet was too good to miss. And so it was that, on the evening of Saturday 26 January, the day following the anniversary of Burns' death in 1759, forty people gathered at two long tables under the lights of St Margaret's to commemorate the occasion with a traditional haggis supper.

It is true that we lacked a piper to play the haggis in, but suitably wailly recorded music did the job well enough. The haggis was duly marched in, and carved by Revd Richard. It was then addressed at length by Revd Morag in fine rich Scottish brogue. Unfortunately she did not come with subtitles so I was scarcely able to understand a word, but it was all done most magnificently. The haggis was then marched out again to the kitchen, where Revd Richard carved it, and added to each plate the neeps (mashed swede) and tatties. The meals were then carried to the tables by an eager team of volunteers. In the meantime, a bottle of single malt whisky, kindly provided by two parishioners, was poured into shot glasses to give everyone a chance to toast the haggis, and we all tucked in.

A word needs to be said about several brave people here. There were a few who admitted that they had never tasted haggis before, but without exception they pronounced it delicious and many of them came back for more. The evening concluded with shortbread and coffee, and a very cordial atmosphere developed. We had provided a large selection of appropriate background music in case conversation flagged a bit, but we need not have worried. Jollity was very much the order of the evening, and the music could scarcely be heard as satisfied diners chatted well into the evening.

This event was a first for St Margaret's, and I do not think it will be the last. Enormous credit must go to Revd Richard and Revd Morag, who thought of the idea and did all the purchasing, cooking, table-setting and many other jobs which were necessary for our enjoyment. Even the mountain of washing-up at the end was cleared very rapidly by Richard and his gang of volunteers.

Were you there? If you were, I hope you agree that it was a great occasion. If you were not, there may be another chance next year and we look forward to you joining us. **Peter Roberts**

**A Bumper Family History Open Day will be held on Saturday 23 February
at the Long Shop Museum, Leiston, IP16 4ES, from 11am to 4pm**

A variety of exhibits will be on show, including local graveyard surveys, war memorials, directories, parish registers, census returns, old maps of the area – and Peter Drew's extensive collection of historical newspaper cuttings and postcards featuring the Sizewell, Aldringham and Friston areas.

A special feature of our Open Day this year will be the results of our project to preserve the Leiston Grammar School sports team photographs, of which there are over 80, from the period 1933 to 1968. The digitised photos, catalogue, etc will be available to view at the Open Day, and at our Help Centre at the Old Council Offices in Leiston, and copies will be provided to any interested alumni or members of their families. The original photographs have now been deposited with the Suffolk Record Office.

And back by popular demand – Have you got any old family photos which you can't put a date to? Bring them along and let our expert advise you.

Are you trying to trace your military ancestors? or your family tree? Advice and help will be available from experienced researchers. And we'll have our computers with (hopefully) Internet to help with your research.
