HARVEST AND THANKSGIVING

Celebrating the gathering of the harvest is something which seems to have taken place all round the world throughout all time. For all people the message is the same “no food – no life”. After the harvest is a time of storing away and setting aside enough food for the winter months. The farmers fill their barns and we, the small gardeners, gather our produce and store it in the garden shed or in our freezers. Pickles, chutneys and jams are made to enjoy throughout the next year. It is also a time of those who have plenty sharing with those who have little. God gave his people a law which is recorded in the Old Testament as follows:

When you reap the harvest of your land, you shall not reap to the very edges of your field, or gather the gleanings of your harvest. You shall not strip your vineyard bare, or gather the fallen grapes of your vineyard; you shall leave them for the poor and the alien: I am the Lord your God.

Leviticus 19 v9-10

Sharing the harvest with others can take different forms. In many churches today at Harvest Festivals people bring gifts of fresh produce and flowers which, at one time, were given to the elderly. Nowadays tinned and packaged produce is usually brought to church and given to the local food bank, to be distributed to those in need, as happens at our church.

In some parts of Africa Christians set aside a piece of land which they call “God’s Acre”. This is cultivated during the year and the harvest is either given to those in need or sold and the proceeds given to the poor or for the upkeep of the church.

All good gifts around us are sent from heaven above
Then thank the Lord, O thank the Lord for all his love.

The second element of the harvest season is a time of thanksgiving. For everything we receive, we must give thanks to God for all the good things of life. For the material things that are provided and for the love which God gives so freely to us all.

Pondering Prayer

“Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil”

This can be a difficult phrase to explain or understand. For myself I prefer to read it as if punctuated “lead us, not into temptation, but deliver us from evil” which gives it a different sense. After all why would God be leading us into temptation? So for me it becomes ‘Lead us, Father, your will not mine, keep us away from temptation and the devil’. But perhaps it is not quite that straightforward.

In his letter the apostle James writes: “Count it all joy when you meet various trials for you know the testing of your faith produces steadfastness.” (James: 1.v2) We pray not to be tempted but paradoxically we are also aware that it is only through temptation that we become strong.

Perhaps one explanation are the words Jesus said to His disciples in the garden of Gethsemane on that last fateful evening. “Watch and pray, that you enter not into temptation.” If we fail to be on our guard, if we live carelessly without watching or praying, we leave ourselves more open to being within the scope of temptation and find it too strong for us to resist.

Charles Gore, a former Bishop of Oxford, suggested that may not the prayer be interpreted in this way? “Make us watchful and prayerful so that we do not fall into temptation – as in a snare or a trap. Or perhaps it would be better to interpret the prayer more generally as in expression of self-distrust, for which we have only too sufficient grounds, as a prayer like Jesus - again as he prayed in Gethsemane - “Father if it be possible let the cup of trial pass from me without my drinking it, nevertheless thy will be done.” (John 18).

James also writes, “Let no one say I am tempted by God; for God cannot be tempted with evil and he himself tempts no one.” (James 1:v13).

Keeping us from temptation – so delivering us away from evil – from the evil one, the devil. The devil has been rather out of vogue for some time now but it is said by theologians and others, including I believe, C S Lewis, that “Satan never did a more successful stroke than when he persuaded people to disbelieve in his own existence.” A thought worth considering?

No doubt many of you may have your own ideas on the meaning of this difficult phrase in the prayer. That is good and that is also a good reason to pray the Lord’s Prayer regularly, and thinking about the various parts of the whole as you do.

The doxology at the end of the prayer was not in the earliest versions of the gospels although added quite early on as the Christian Church grew and needs no explanation.

I pray that my ponderings on the Lord’s Prayer have been of use to you and

I pray that my ponderings on the Lord's Prayer have been of use to you and have been of help to your own prayer lives and thinking. Next month I propose to look at prayer as we come across it throughout the Bible and perhaps in particular what the Psalmist said and prayed.

RIDE AND STRIDE 2020

Saturday 12 September, 9 am – 5 pm

A message from the SHCT about the Ride and Stride which will be a rather different event this year.

After all these weeks in lockdown we hear reports from all over the county of friends and supporters who are looking forward to getting on their bikes for our annual church to church event. In view of the importance of the work of the Trust for this, our main fundraising event, we are doing all we can to ensure the Ride takes place this year despite the need for sensible health precautions at all times.

The situation changes weekly – churches are now open for services. There is every indication that it will be safe for riders and striders to participate, provided of course they keep social distance. We hope you will also think it is safe, but of course it must be the decision and responsibility of all participants and parishes as to whether they take part. If the Covid-19 situation deteriorates we shall not hesitate to cancel but, at present, signs are looking positive.

The best guidance we can give at present is:

- Follow the Government guidance on Covid-19 prevailing at the time
- Some churches may not be open or there is no-one to welcome you – just sign the register
- Don't worry if there is no register, just mark your own sponsor form for churches visited.
- As an alternative to signing in, you could take a photo of the church sign as evidence
- Take your own pen
- It is unlikely there will be refreshments, so please take your own
- Toilets may not be available
- If you enter a church touch as little as possible
- Take hand sanitiser
- Remember the Highway Code and use lanes and minor roads where possible

Obviously we all pray that come September the guidelines WILL have further relaxed and we can all enjoy the day much as ever.



Extract from my journal Monday 17th August 2020

"I have just finished reading "21 Lessons for the 21st Century" by Yuval Noah Harari. Barack Obama says of this book it is "provocative". I agree it is certainly thought provoking.

Meditation helps us to concentrate on the exploration and understanding of our minds despite all the numerous distractions around us, at any point during the day, and the 'stories' ** we have been fed every day of our lives.

In the end there is only one person anyone can ever get to control; ... OURSELVES. I can choose, of my own free will, to be content with my lot or not. If I am NOT content then only I can decide what is the source of the discontent and what I can do about putting those issues right.

Sure, I can think of some things that would add to that contentment but it is I who would have to act to achieve them. And I have to accept that a lot of my contentment is based on the 'now' and that the only sure thing that will happen is change.

When change comes then I will have to search ways in which I can accept them and live with them, trying to get back to my inner contentment.


I have my background 'stories'**, one of which is a strong faith in God.

I have kept journals since I was in my late twenties. The entries are spontaneous thoughts that occur to me at the time of writing. It is just 'raw' information without refinement and probably a lot of spelling mistakes and bad punctuation... but it always seems a good idea at the time. I would recommend Harari's book.

MR AND MRS TIGGYWINKLE – OR PERHAPS NOT?

When we were building our house, Fred dug soakaways under what is now the lawn to return to the land the rainwater which fell on our roof. In the morning he would regularly find a hedgehog had fallen into the soakaway and would be waiting patiently to be rescued. Over the years there have been occasional sightings of hedgehogs in the garden. Last year one appeared regularly, to the extent that I set up a feeding station on the patio outside the sitting room french doors. The food and water I put out disappeared overnight. Time passed.

One day, talking to my sister, she told me her son had bought her a Trail or wildlife camera and she set it up in her garden from time to time. She offered to let me borrow it and view my hedgehog. What a revelation! The camera took both still photographs and video. At night the pictures are black and white but in daytime full colour. The hedgehog seemed to visit twice a night to feed, once at about 10 pm and then again after midnight. The camera was triggered most nights but then I had to return the camera.

During lockdown I celebrated my 70th birthday and my sister in London sent me some money to buy myself a present. So I bought my own camera and soon got it set up. I am able to download the photographs and video clips onto my laptop. Sometimes in the evening I hear the noise of the saucers containing the food and water rattling and put the outside light on to see the hedgehog having supper. The light doesn't seem to upset the hedgehog.



About two weeks ago when I downloaded the night's output I was amazed to see, not one but two hedgehogs, both enjoying their meal. So, are they a pair? Or two males or females? I don't know how to tell the difference. Will they one day bring their hoglets to join in? Time will tell. My feeding station is simply two bricks with a slate flat on top with saucers underneath for water and food which is specially made for hedgehogs and sold locally.

ENGLISH HARVEST FESTIVALS

In England the harvest festival is called the harvest home. This usually takes place in September. Offerings of fruit and vegetables are placed around the altar for a thanksgiving service that would make sure there was a good crop for the next year. After the service the offerings are given to those less fortunate. The harvest home is held at the end of September once all harvesting of crops had been finished. People take great pride in decorating the churches and often keep the best of the harvest for this festival.

The altar is decorated with vases which hold autumn leaves, berries and flowers and special tables are set up to hold the offerings that people bring. There are pumpkins, cabbages, baskets of fruit and vegetables of all kinds. People also come to church to say prayers of thanks and to sing hymns. At the end of the service the produce that has been left as offerings are each blessed and sent to hospitals for the sick and needy.

History tells of how villages belonged to the rich landowners as part of their estates and that the villagers were employed to farm and cultivate their gardens. The harvest festival was held as a way of thanking the gods for a good harvest. It was also a way of thanking his employees for all their hard work. The harvest was supplied by the landowner.

Today's harvest is celebrated on a Sunday during the main service of the day. The date of the service can be set well in advance instead of waiting for the last of the harvest to be brought in. This is because it is no longer labour intensive as machinery has taken over the gathering of the crops.

In some parts of England Lammas, also known as the Celebration of Bread, is celebrated. The preparation of bread as a primary staple is a ritual in itself. It is the time of the year when the passing summer is celebrated and the year is moving on to autumn. Goods are in storage and the people thank the gods for a plentiful harvest and ask for a safe winter.
