Pondering Prayer

“Remember those in prison as if you were
in prison with them. Hebrews 13:3 ”

Reading Psalm 13 moves me deeply. King David is obviously going through a desperately difficult time.

He begins with a heart-rending plea, “How long, O Lord? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me?” David feels abandoned by God, whilst his enemies are getting the better of him.

A report on Radio 4 about Andrew Brunson, a Baptist Pastor who has spent twenty-five years of his life ministering to Christians in Turkey reminds me of the anguish with which David cries out to the Lord. Arrested by the authorities in Turkey he has become a pawn in a battle between Turkey and the United States. Imagine the distress of having developed a love for the people of Turkey and then merely for political gain, being kept in prison for over a year now. His daughter has been allowed a visit recently and reports that he is at a low ebb, which is having a deep affect upon his health.

I believe the verse at the top reminds us that we are called to pray earnestly for those who are imprisoned for their faith, as though we are bound with them. King David pours out his heart to God. “How long must I make decisions alone with sorrow in my heart day after day? How long will my enemy triumph over me? Look at me! Answer me O Lord my God.”

Then suddenly there is a shift in David’s prayer. “Light up my eyes, or else I will die” he says. It’s as though he recognizes that how we view things varies, even though the situation may remain the same. He wants God to give him the ability to see things through his eyes, otherwise he will continue to go downhill emotionally and his enemy will gloat saying, “I have overpowered him.”

Crying out to the Lord creates a shift within him and he ends his psalm (prayer) with the words, "but I trust your mercy. My heart finds joy in your salvation. I will sing to the Lord because he has been good to me." What a contrast! The circumstances haven't altered, but his outlook has.

That's so important for you and me and for those who are in desperate circumstances. Telling it the way it is; pouring out our heart before the Lord and then asking him to create the shift within us that enables us to take heart and hold on to him as we wait for his answer to our prayer, makes all the difference.

Will you pray with me for Pastor Andrew Brunson and for the suffering church? If you want to be reminded of God's power to help the prisoner, read Acts 12 and Genesis 41.

ALDE VALLEY FAMILY HISTORY GROUP

After a pause for the peak summer holiday period in August, the next meeting of the Alde Valley Suffolk Family History Group will be on Monday, 17 September, when Pip Wright will give a talk entitled 'Witches in and around Suffolk'.

For as long as history itself, we've been a superstitious lot in East Anglia. It is nearly 300 years since our elected representatives told us to stop persecuting witches, but old habits die hard. After all, if the Bible and Shakespeare recognised witches, who are we to disagree? The trouble is, in a confusing world, it is comforting in a way to have an explanation for the inexplicable. Be it sickness or infestation, storm, blight or sudden death, then sorcery could just be the answer. A whole folk-lore has grown up around the 'wise ones' of Suffolk, so that in most of our towns and villages, you can still find someone who will tell you tales of their local 'witch'. But truth to tell, the history of witchcraft in and around Suffolk is an altogether darker story, about suffering, persecution and death. It reached into the hearts of families and communities and created a fear and a hysteria that lasted until recent times.

Pip is a retired primary school teacher, living in Stowmarket, who writes local history books and gives talks to groups of all kinds and all ages across East Anglia.

The talk will be held at the United Church, High Street, Leiston, IP16 4EL, and will start at 7.30 p.m. Everyone is welcome; admission costs £1 for members and £3 for non-members, including coffee/tea and biscuits. Parking is available in the adjacent Co-op car park, but you will need to register your car number in-store or face the risk of a £100 fine.






Farewell to Margaret's



The Leiston St Margaret's Church charity shop has been trading in Leiston since the mid-1990s. It was a time many will remember the church had only just raised the money and paid for the church roof to be replaced at a cost of around £100,000. That now left the organ needing a complete overhaul, having suffered from the previously leaking roof, among other problems. The cost was to be around £7,000. How could the church raise more money?

Patsy was standing near the entrance to Solar when she had her vision. Opposite was a rather rundown shop that had been empty for some time. It belonged to the now late Mr Peter Westbrook so she plucked up the courage to ask if he would allow her to borrow it for a few weeks in an attempt to raise the money the church needed. He agreed and charged no rent. With the blessing of our then vicar, the Revd. David Lowe, Patsy accumulated friends from the congregation and the local community who cleaned the shop out and volunteered to take turns to serve in the shop. Donations of goods were soon forthcoming and £7,000 was raised within 3 months.

With the generosity of Mr Westbrook and later his son and daughter, the shop has remained open ever since. Since it first opened £250,000 has been raised. This has been used toward the outreach of the church within the Parish, the maintenance of the church building and assisting us to pay our annual quota to the diocese.

20 years on it is a different world. The high street has changed and the shop has become unviable. In recent months sales have barely covered the cost of electricity and general maintenance. This is partly due to the rising numbers of charity shops in town but also the inability to be able to man the shop 5 days a week. Sadly, the church has had no alternative but to close Margaret's from 31 August.

Without the generous help of those who volunteered to work in the shop, and those who so generously donated clothes, bric-a-brac, jewellery and books, the benefits this little shop has been able to provide over the past 20 or so years would not have been possible. May God bless you all. To customers and helpers please keep in touch. God and the congregation invite you to join us at a church service on any Sunday morning and to keep supporting us at the summer and autumn fairs and other events. **Patsy and Bernard Smith**

ALAN FOX 1 September 1942-17 July 2018



Alan was born in South Shields into a sea faring family. As his father was at sea, in the Merchant Navy, travelling the world he was brought up mainly by his mother, with help from older brother Les. Not many years after the war Alan's oldest brother Norman died when he fell from his ship whilst it was in dry dock in Philadelphia.

Alan attended the local schools and passed the Eleven Plus, a fact of which his mother was very proud as he was the youngest in the year. The church the family attended had a concert party and Alan took part in many pantos and shows. He also learnt to play badminton there. He had fond memories of pumping the Church organ on Sunday mornings so it was not new to him to find our beautiful organ had problems and some of the men pumped the bellows.

In 1962 he met Maureen who with two friends joined the badminton club. On first acquaintance Maureen admits she didn't think much of him but he sort of grew on her, and so she agreed to go out with him, but she did lead him a merry dance. They became engaged in 1963 but following a bad motor cycle accident Alan was in hospital for four months. They married in September 1964 and spent their spare time travelling around the North East taking part in pantomimes and reviews. Wayne was born in 1966. The following year Alan attended a dinner and heard Lord Robbins talking about pit closures and heard that Whitburn was to close. However the CEEB were advertising positions at Sizewell A, Alan applied and so the family arrived in Leiston. Having come from a fairly busy town and port Leiston took a little getting used to.

During a stressful first year, Jason was born and Maureen was ill but they eventually settled down in their new surroundings. At the time the specialist predicted that Jason would never be able to achieve things like reading and writing. Maureen remembers sitting in the hospital car park with Alan, and he swore that Jason would be able to read and do lots of other things, and with help this proved to be true.

Alan hated the water and couldn't swim, but he went regularly to Thorpeness and other places and he forced himself to enter the water to help the children to learn to swim. Alan spent many years driving Wayne and his team mates to badminton and football matches and was proud of their achievements.

During Alan's employment at Sizewell he decided on a career change and moved from the electrical department to become what some called a "flour grader" in work study. He stayed in that department until he took early retirement. He decided to drive for the voluntary car scheme and did so for about fifteen years, finishing last year. He loved to sing and joined the choir and the Accord singing group.

Jonathan, our Choirmaster, says "One of Alan's many interests in life was a love of music. At St Margaret's he was involved in a number of different activities and groups which included his long-term devoted service to our choir. He was encouraged to join the choir back in 1999, and for the next nineteen years he showed total dedication and commitment to the choral tradition at St Margaret's. Always a very modest man, he was quite self-deprecating about his vocal ability. However, we will sincerely miss the resonance and depth of his rich bass voice in services, and of course his enthusiasm and sense of fun as part of the team at weekly choir rehearsals."

At Hilda's instigation Maureen and Alan joined the LTAA bowls club a few years ago and spent many happy hours playing and meeting people from all over Suffolk. Alan was very proud of his club and their achievements. He was a selfless supporter of Maureen in all her projects particularly the annual Flower Festival held in St Margaret's which gave so much pleasure to so many people. He loved nature and wildlife. He was a strong man but would be moved to tears by an animal's plight especially if it was being badly treated. He loved dearly the family's dogs. Although a private man he liked to socialise and loved holidays abroad. He was never a "pub" man although he did like a wee dram. The Fox family motto is "Always Faithful" and Alan certainly upheld this to his family and friends.

Alan had a strong faith and has been a member of St Margaret's church family for many, many years. He was a PCC member and lovingly cared for its fabric for a long time as scrutiny of church papers shows. He, along with Maureen, worked tirelessly to help in the smooth running of Margaret's Shop, sorting through donations. Alan will be greatly missed by everyone who knew him and we offer to Maureen and the family our sincere condolences.
